National Incident Based Reporting System

The FBI has changed the Uniform Crime Reporting Model to a National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). This implementation has occurred to improve the overall quality of crime data collected by law enforcement; NIBRS captures details on each single crime incident—as well as on separate offenses within the same incident. To further explain, the previous UCR model was based on a hierarchy of offenses and only the most serious crimes were reported in each incident regardless of how many crimes occurred. NIBRS will account for every crime that occurs during a reported incident which may result in several different crimes being reported. Additionally, Part I offenses are now known as Group A offenses. Part II offenses are now considered Group B offenses. The list of Group A offenses has also been expanded to include 28 offense categories made up of 71 Group A Offenses as opposed to the previous 7 Part I offenses. Group B Offenses now have 13 categories and encompass all the crimes for which the national UCR program collects data that are not considered Group A offenses. Group A offenses are to be reported to the UCR Program through the National Incident Based Reporting System. These offenses are serious crimes which occur with regularity in all areas of the country and are most likely to be reported to the pol

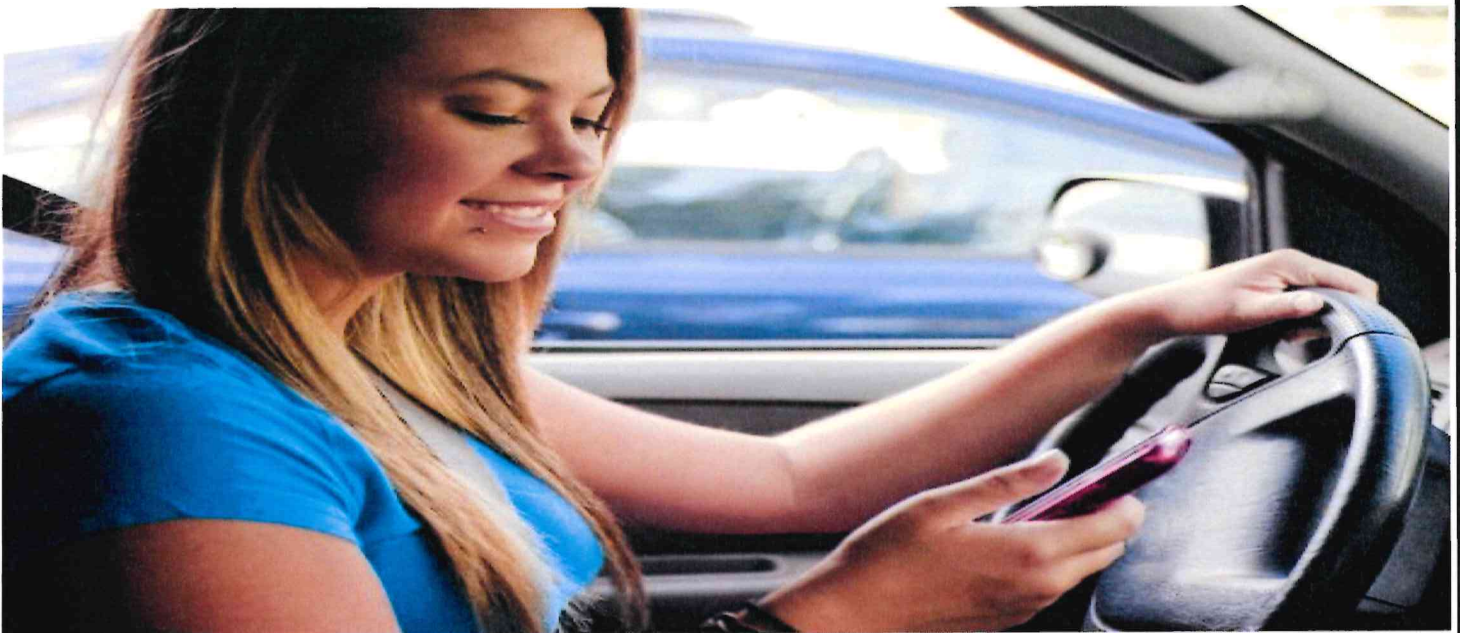

Mount Airy Police Department's K9 Uri has received donation of body armor

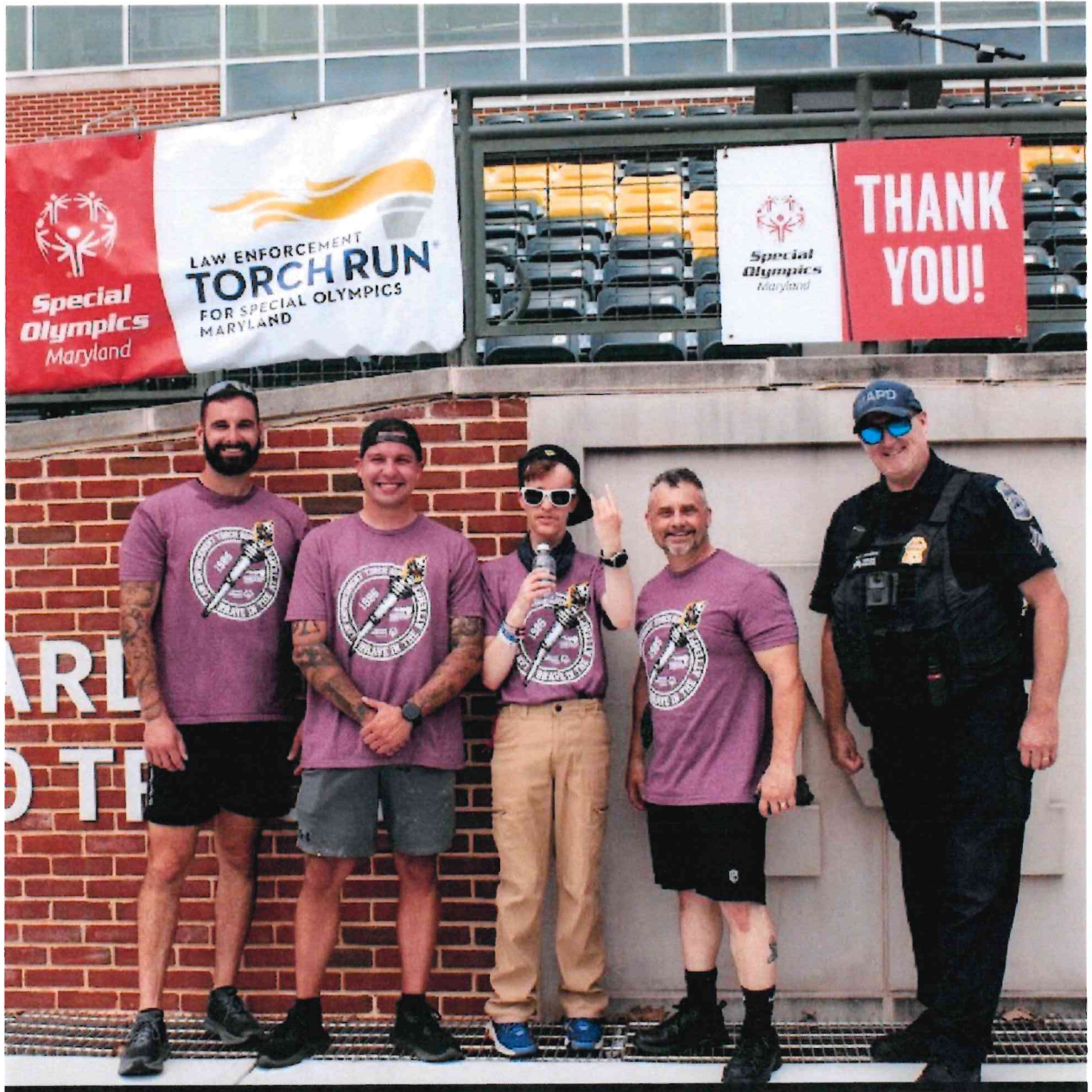
Mount Airy Police Department, MD - K9 Uri has received a bullet and stab protective vest thanks to a charitable donation from non-profit organization Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. K9 Uri's vest was sponsored by Sherri Widlund of Colorado Springs, CO and embroidered with the sentiment "In honor of Marge and Boo Wright".

Vested Interest in K9s, Inc., established in 2009, is a 501(c)(3) charity whose mission is to provide bullet and stab protective vests and other assistance to dogs of law enforcement and related agencies throughout the United States. This potentially lifesaving body armor for four-legged K9 officers is U.S. made, custom fitted, and National Institute of Justice (NIJ) certified. Since its inception, Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. has provided over 6,513 vests valued at \$6.9 million to K9s in all 50 states, made possible by both private and corporate donations.

The program is open to U.S. dogs at least 20 months old and actively employed and certified with law enforcement or related agencies. K9s with expired vests are also eligible to participate. There are an estimated 30,000 law enforcement K9s throughout the United States.

Mount Airy Police Department - MD TRAFFIC SAFETY TIP

What to do when traffic lights are not functioning!

When traffic lights are non-functional (dark) or in flashing red mode, The intersection must be treated as a four-way stop. This means all traffic must come to a full stop and follow the rules of right-of-way, rather than proceeding through a dark signal.

Key Rules for Treated Intersections

Stop First, Go First: The first vehicle reaching the intersection and making a full stop has the right-of-way to proceed.

Yield to the Right: If two or more vehicles arrive at the same time, the driver on the left must yield to the driver on the right.

Opposite Directions: If two vehicles are facing each other and arrive at the same time, both may proceed with caution, provided they are going straight or both are turning right.

Flashing Red vs. Yellow:

Flashing Red: Treated as a stop sign (full stop required).

Flashing Yellow: Requires slowing down and using caution, but a full stop is not necessary unless traffic is not clear.

Safety Tips for Inoperative Lights

Never assume: Do not assume other drivers will stop; proceed with caution.

Do not follow closely: Treat it as a "stop-and-go," not "follow the leader".

Power Restoration: Signals may still flash even after power is restored, as they often need to be reset by officials.

This protocol is legally required to avoid accidents when traffic management systems fail due to power outages or technical.

Know Before You Ride: Maryland E-Bike & E-Scooter Laws

There has been an increase in the use of electric bikes and scooters throughout our community. While many of these devices are perfectly legal, some high-powered models being marketed as “e-bikes” but might actually fall into a different vehicle classification under Maryland law.

Legal E-Bikes

Maryland recognizes three classes of electric bicycles. To qualify as an e-bike, the vehicle must have fully operable pedals and a motor of 750 watts or less.

- Class 1: Pedal-assist only, up to 20 mph
- Class 2: Throttle-powered, up to 20 mph
- Class 3: Pedal-assist only, up to 28 mph (operators must be at least 16 years old)

Legal e-bikes do not require registration, a driver’s license, or insurance.

Helmet Requirement

Maryland law requires all operators and passengers under the age of 16 riding an e-bike to wear a properly fitted bicycle helmet. The Allegany County Sheriff’s Office strongly encourages helmet use for all riders. A helmet is one of the most effective and practical ways to prevent serious head injury in the event of a crash.

Electric Scooters

Electric scooters with a maximum speed of 20 mph do not require registration or a driver’s license. Riders must still obey all traffic laws, including stopping at stop signs, yielding right-of-way, and traveling in the proper direction of traffic.

Not All “E-Bikes” Are Legal E-Bikes

Many electric vehicles sold online today can reach speeds exceeding 30, 40, or even 50 mph. If a vehicle exceeds Maryland’s e-bike limits on mph or lacks operable pedals, it may be classified as a moped, motor scooter, or motorcycle.

These vehicles may require:

- ✓ A valid driver’s license
- ✓ Registration and license plates
- ✓ Insurance
- ✓ Compliance with all applicable motor vehicle laws

Operating an improperly registered or unlicensed high-speed electric vehicle on public roadways may result in traffic citations, towing, and impoundment.

As summer begins and more riders take to our streets, trails, and neighborhoods, we encourage parents to ensure their children are wearing helmets and understand the rules of the road before riding. We encourage motorists to be more aware of their surroundings, bike lanes, and more youth out riding bikes.

Please ride responsibly, obey all laws, and do your part to help keep our community safe for everyone.

E-Bikes are bicycles equipped with operable pedals and an electric motor of 750 watts or less. Riders must obey all traffic laws and follow posted signs.



E-MOTOS ARE NOT E-BIKES. THEY ARE MOTOR VEHICLES.

Electric motorcycles or mopeds (E-motos) exceed the power and speed limits of e-bikes and are treated as standard motorcycles or mopeds under Maryland law. They may not have operable pedals.



- Require a valid driver's license, registration, and insurance
- Not permitted on sidewalks, trails, or bike/multi-use paths
- Must follow all motor vehicle laws, including lighting and safety equipment
- Helmets are required for all riders and passengers

A REMINDER FOR PARENTS



We are seeing younger riders operating higher-speed e-bikes and e-motos without supervision. These devices can be extremely dangerous when used improperly.

When unsafe riding is observed, parents may be contacted and asked to respond and retrieve both the rider and the device.

Persons with cognitive impairments and disabilities I would also suggest to law enforcement that when dealing with such situations with older adults and people with disabilities to inquire on other programs or services someone might be receiving. For instance, family members of individuals with autism or other disabilities may be enrolled in DDA programs where they may have monies to spend on such assistive technology. Similarly, family members caring for individuals with dementia and other cognitive impairments may be eligible for other programs such as Tembo Health which offers a tremendous amount of support for families including resources, and a possible funding up to \$2500 which may assist in such purchases. We can provide that information to individuals.

What to do After a Natural Disaster

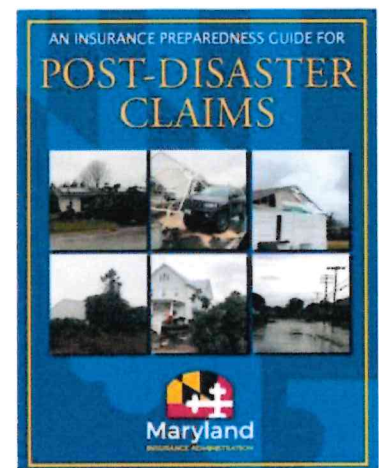


There's been a natural disaster (examples: storm, hurricane, tornado, hail, flood) and you have damage to your home or vehicle - now what? The Maryland Insurance Administration can assist you by providing contact information for your insurer or by helping you with questions about how to file a claim. You can reach us at 800-492-6116 or please see resources below:

Quick Tips if you have damage after a storm:

- Make sure your adjuster and insurer have your current phone number.
- Make sure your address is visible from the street. You may need to post a sign with your address in the yard.
- Try to be there when the adjuster visits and point out all damage.
- Get multiple bids from contractors and compare them with the adjuster's report before settling the claim.
- Save proof that you paid the deductible on the claim. State law makes it illegal for contractors or roofers to offer to waive a deductible or to promise a rebate for your deductible. It also allows your insurer to request proof, such a receipt or canceled check, that you paid the deductible.

- In the event a federal disaster declaration is issued, Marylanders can apply for federal aid for damage not covered by insurance at [DisasterAssistance.gov](https://www.disasterassistance.gov).
- Report price gouging. It's illegal to charge excessive prices for building materials and necessities to take advantage of a disaster. You can report suspected price gouging to the [Office of the Attorney General](#) or the [Maryland Department of Labor](#).

Tips for when you need to file a claim:

- [Call your insurance producer \(agent or broker\) or insurer as soon as possible to report property damage.](#)
- [Be ready to answer questions about the damage.](#)
- Ask your insurer about an advance payment if you need help quickly.
- [Ask about living expenses. Most policies will cover some of the costs you have if you are unable to live in your home because of damage that is covered by your insurance policy. It is a good idea to keep your receipts for these costs since your insurer may ask for proof.](#)
